

Thank you for stepping out in faith to host a Gospel 101 Circle. Whether you're an experienced Circle leader or this is your very first time, we believe your willingness to create a space for people to engage the Gospel will make an eternal impact.

This guide will equip you with everything you need to facilitate simple, meaningful, and transformative conversations that help people ***learn the Gospel, live the Gospel, and share the Gospel in real life.***

Your Role as a Host

You are not expected to teach. You are hosting a conversation. Think of yourself as a guide who creates space for people to share, learn, and take steps forward.

Your primary responsibilities:

- ☑ Create a warm, welcoming environment.
- ☑ Facilitate discussion using the provided weekly guide.
- ☑ Pray for your group members and encourage them.
- ☑ Help keep the group focused on next steps rather than perfection.



What Your Group Meetings Should Look Like

Later in this booklet are guides for each week, which follow a simple weekly rhythm:

- 1. Welcome & Connect** – Light conversation and stories, snacks, a warm greeting to start, and a possible icebreaker.
- 2. Share the Weekly Practice** – Discuss together how the group lived out last week's assignment.
- 3. Sermon Reflection** – Ask a few questions tying the weekend message to the book lessons.
- 4. Gospel 101 Book Discussion** – Work through key questions and themes from the book.
- 5. Prayer** – Pray for one person each group member is seeking to reach or the prayer prompts listed in this guide.
- 6. Preview Next Week** – Encourage participation in the assignments from the book before the next group session.



Your gatherings can take 45–90 minutes depending on the group. If you land on an agreed end time, be sure to honor that time commitment. You can bring the conversation to a close for those who need to leave, and then invite the group to stick around if anyone has the margin to do so.

Creating a Welcoming Environment

Most people decide in the *first seven minutes* if they feel comfortable. A great group environment includes:

- ☑ A clean, simple space with enough seating.
- ☑ Soft music or light refreshments.
- ☑ Clear instructions on where to park and enter.
- ☑ A warm welcome at the door.
- ☑ Setting a tone of grace, openness, and authenticity.

Remember: People are *hungry* for real relationships. The environment you create can help satisfy that hunger!

Facilitation Tips

Great hosts **don't** do all the talking—they *guide* the conversation and keep it *life-giving*. Some helpful tips:

- Ask open-ended questions.
- Allow for silence. People need time to think.
- Affirm participation without correcting everything.
- Encourage quieter members and gently limit dominant talkers.
- Keep discussions on track and Gospel-focused.
- Point back to the Bible, the sermon, the Gospel 101 book, and ultimately to Jesus.
- End on time (this helps build trust!).

Handling Difficult Questions

You do not need to have all the answers. When a complex theological or controversial question comes up, try saying:

- “That’s a great question. Let’s discuss that together next week (or at another time).”
- “Let’s explore what Scripture says first.”
- “Could we come back to that question after we finish our conversation about _____ tonight?”
- “What do some of the rest of you think?”
- “I might not have the best answer right now—let me ask around and get back to you.” (...and make sure to do it!)

Remember: Humility *builds* credibility—appearing to have all the answers creates distance!



Group Care Boundaries

As a host, you are a *shepherd*—but not a counselor. If someone shares something heavy or beyond your comfort level:

- Listen with compassion.
- Affirm that God is present and available.
- Contact your Circles Coordinator or Campus Pastor for support.

You are not alone in leading this group!

Weekly Story Sharing

We want to celebrate what God is doing in our groups! Each week, you'll receive an email with a link to submit:

- ◆ A story of a Gospel conversation.
- ◆ A step of obedience someone took.
- ◆ A breakthrough moment for someone in your group.
- ◆ Attendance and a prayer request for your group.

These stories will help *inspire* our entire church family! Please ask the person if you may share their story with your campus leaders.

If Your Group Is Struggling

It's normal for groups to experience challenges. Common struggles and possible solutions include:

Low Participation – Ask open-ended questions; or break into pairs briefly to get everyone talking, then ask to report.

Dominant Personalities/Voices – “Thank you—let’s hear from someone else too.” You may also need to have a private conversation with the person after the gathering.

Long Tangents – “Great point. Let’s circle back to the main question.” Re-asking the question could be a subtle hint too.

People Missing Meetings – Reach out personally. A simple text or call matters.

If challenges persist, contact your campus Circles Coordinator, the Director of Adult Ministry, or Campus Pastor. ***We’re here to help.***

After the Campaign

During Week 7–9, encourage your group to discuss:

- ☑ Do we want to continue as a group? (*We can: go our separate ways, continue meeting, or begin new groups!*)
- ☑ What rhythms worked well?
- ☑ What's next for us spiritually?

Your campus Circles Coordinator or the Director of Adult Ministry can provide simple resources for your next steps:

- Suggested studies
- Service opportunities
- Discipleship pathways

Many healthy groups began as message series discussion groups!

WEEKLY CONVERSATION GUIDE

Use the following pages to form a plan, rhythm, or flow for each week's conversation. This guide picks up with week 4 of *The Gospel* teaching series on the book of Romans. The first week in this guide will serve as an introduction to the Gospel 101 small group campaign and allow for your group to get to know each other as you prepare for this journey together!

WEEK 1

Key Scripture: Romans 2:1-29

Big Idea: Religious or not, we desperately need the Gospel! It isn't a matter of our best behavior or law-keeping. God's judgement is we are all lawbreakers, and it is time for God's people to lead the way in repentance and a circumcision of the heart.

Icebreaker Question:

What comes to mind when you think of God's judgement, or consider God as our judge?

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Introduction):

- In the Introduction, Jeff Dodge shares a quote recalling a friend’s attempt at sharing the Gospel. Was the Gospel clear to you when you first heard it? Is it clear to you today?
- Which of the two ditches described in the Introduction do you tend to fall into when you try to share the Gospel?
- “*Studying the gospel necessarily leads to worship...*” (p. 4) Honestly... is this your experience? Why or why not?

WEEK 2 - The Gospel Reset: Why the Gospel Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 1:16–17, 3:1-20; 1 Corinthians 15:1–8

Big Idea: Before we can learn, live, or share the gospel, we must rediscover it. The church loses power when it assumes the gospel instead of clearly articulating it.

Icebreaker Question:

What is one word you've often used to describe Christianity—and why do you think you chose that word?

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 1):

- How does Paul’s summary in 1 Corinthians 15 clarify or simplify your understanding of the Gospel?
- Which part of the Gospel story is easiest for you to share with someone—and which is hardest?
- Why is it important to consider the ‘eternal gospel’ (the whole context of the Bible) rather than a narrower view?
- How would you explain the Gospel to a friend in 60 seconds?

Prayer Prompt:

Pray for clarity and confidence to articulate the Gospel this week.

- Read and complete assignments from Lesson 2 by our next gathering.

WEEK 3 - The God Who Rescues: Why Starting with God Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 3:21-26; Genesis 1-3

Big Idea: To understand the gospel, we must understand God—His holiness, justice, mercy, and love. The gospel begins with God’s character, not human need.

Icebreaker Question:

When have you felt pursued, welcomed, or valued by someone unexpectedly?

Assignment Updates:

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 2):

- What stood out about God’s character in this lesson from the book?
- Where do you see in your own life a dislike for God’s authority (or anyone else’s)?
- How do the three attributes described demonstrate both God’s love for his people AND his authoritative position over them? Why is it important to see both of these themes together?
- What obstacles keep you from pursuing the lost the way God does?

Prayer Prompt:

Praise God for His greatness, holiness, and tenderness. Pray also for God’s compassion for the people in your life who may be far from Him.

WEEK 4 - Humanity Undone: Why Understanding Humanity Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 1:18-3:31; Psalm 19; Ephesians 4:17-19

Big Idea: The gospel only becomes good news when we understand the bad news. Humanity is sinful, broken, and unable to save itself.

Icebreaker Question:

What is one moment in your life where God became more real to you?

Assignment Updates:

Sermon Reflection:

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The major Takeaway that impacted the way I live:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 3):

- In what ways have you encountered people ‘blaming’ someone else for their disbelief in God?
- How well do you deal with correction or when someone calls you out?
- Romans 2:4 says God is full of kindness, restraint, and patience. Though totally justified in his sentencing, this final Judge has chosen to offer us a way to enter that judgement day without fear. How might you be able to help friends or neighbors consider their posture before God? How might you point them to their (and your) need for Jesus?

Prayer Prompt:

Pray for boldness and opportunities to share the ‘bad news’ so that others gain a clear understanding for why we need Jesus.

- Invite 3 friends or family members to come with you to one of our Easter worship experiences this week!

WEEK 5 - The Christ Who Saves: Why the Centrality of Christ Matters (Easter Message)

Key Scripture: Romans 4:1-25; 1 Corinthians 15:1-28; Matthew 4:1-11; Isaiah 53

Big Idea: Jesus is the central Hero of the Gospel. Who He is and what He has done defines Christian hope.

Icebreaker Question:

What is something that used to intimidate you but doesn't anymore?

Assignment Updates:

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 4):

- How have you seen people giving up on changing their lives or finding a hero who can destroy our sin and corruption?

- In one clear sentence, capture the Gospel message to you?

Prayer Prompt:

Take a moment to thank God for the life, death, and resurrection of his son, Jesus. Pray also for courage to share how Jesus makes a difference in your life this week.

- Prepare to share about the assignments next week in our group conversation!

WEEK 6 – Declared Righteous: Why Justification Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 3:19-5:21; 8:1-11; Galatians 2:16; Ephesians 2:8-9

Big Idea: Justification is God’s legal declaration that sinners are righteous in Christ—not because of what they do, but because of what Jesus did.

Icebreaker Question:

Tell the story of when someone took the blame you deserved.

Assignment Updates:

- How would you have defined justification, and did this align with how it was defined in Gospel 101?

- What does a biblical understanding of justification do for you? How does it change the way you think, live, or behave?
- How did you react to the story of The Merciful King? Are there any other stories or illustrations that help to communicate how Jesus has justified us?
- How does understanding justification shape how you will share the gospel with others?

Pray for ears to hear how others think we are made right with God, and opportunities to describe the work of Christ.

WEEK 7 - The Response That Saves: Why Our Response Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 6:1-8:17; Acts 17; Colossians 2:11-13

Big Idea: The gospel requires a response—Repentance and belief are how this good news is actually applied to our lives.

Icebreaker Question:

Share about a time the GPS was wrong, you had to stop to get directions, or you were far off course and had to correct.

Assignment Updates:

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 6):

- After reading this Lesson, why would you say that sharing the good news is not enough?
- How would you describe to someone what it means to repent?
- How is Baptism a symbol of what repentance does? Have you taken the step of Baptism? If so, what was its significance to you?
- How did you initially respond to the gospel? What do repentance and belief look like in your life?
- How did others respond when you asked them, “How will God determine who goes to heaven and who goes to hell?”

Prayer Prompt:

Pray for a right heart response *in you* toward those in your life who need to respond to God’s good news.

Preview for the week ahead:

- Begin to consider what you will do AFTER this small group experience is over. Will you go your separate ways, continue gathering in some way, or begin new groups to help others belong?

WEEK 8 - Welcome Home: Why Belonging Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 8:1-30; 12:1-21; Hebrews 10:23-25

Big Idea: The gospel brings us a new identify and a new community where we belong, which are essential for growth and mission.

Icebreaker Question:

Where have you been touched by loneliness or isolation?
Where have you experienced deep belonging or teamwork?

Assignment Updates:

Sermon Reflection:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 7):

- In what ways has belonging to Jesus changed things for you?
- This new, life-long growth process with Jesus is called sanctification. Where do we find the power to grow, change, and transform our lives? Why is this significant in our understanding of our new identity?
- How are sanctification and adoption intertwined?
- The church is both *universal* and *local*—why is this understanding so important?
- How would you now respond to someone that claims they don't need to belong to a church (or 'go to' a church)?

Prayer Prompt:

Pray about the areas that are in need of transformation still in your sanctification. Pray also for those you are trying to reach to experience true belonging among God's people.

WEEK 9 – The Gospel Movement Begins: Why Culmination Matters

Key Scripture: Romans 8:31-38; Revelation 20-22

Big Idea: Jesus and his gospel are our only hope of full restoration, and this hope spreads when ordinary believers live on mission with courage, clarity, and love. The movement begins now—with us, and with you.

Icebreaker Question:

When you think of *The End*, what are you feeling inside—dread and fear, or hope and expectation? *Why?*

Assignment Updates:

Gospel 101 Book Discussion (Lesson 8):

- Why is John Lennon’s song ‘Imagine’ only a partial hope for the world compared with the Christian hope?
- How do the final chapters of the Bible wrap up the story that began in Genesis?
- With the picture of the new heavens and the new earth the Bible describes, why do you think believers are timid or hesitant to share the end of the story? How might judgement and hell be good news?
- What causes you to look forward to the restoration of all things?
- How can we contribute to God’s kingdom while we wait for this ultimate ending?

Prayer Prompt:

Pray that you all can more boldly carry the message of hope and restoration found only in the gospel.

Next Steps:

- Review Gospel 101 and create a personal ongoing Gospel action plan.
- This is the last week of the group campaign. What are your next steps after this experience?
 - Do you want to go your separate ways?
 - Do you want to continue meeting?
 - Do you want to begin new groups to help others belong and have a safe space to talk about spiritual things? ((Hosts please let our G101 Team know!))
